Kia Ora koutou Boulcott Whanau,

We are now well and truly into the learning programmes for Term 2! Thank you all for attending our Learning Conversations last week. The teachers enjoyed the opportunity to share key information about your child's learning with you all. The purpose of these sessions were to give you a clear idea of how they were currently progressing and what their next steps in their learning are. This is one of the formal components of our reporting to parents model. At the beginning of Term 3 you will also receive a written report on your child's academic progress. As always, if you have any concerns with your child's learning you are welcome to make contact with their classroom teacher to discuss further. Email is always best so a time can be set aside.

This term we have made slight changes to the structure of our school day so we can make the most of our learning time. For your information the new format of the day is below:



- Block 1:** 8:55 - 10:20am then
- Read and Feed** for 10 mins (children eating their morning tea in class while the teacher reads to them).
- Play** 10:30 to 10:50am
- Block 2:** 10:50 - 11:50am
- Brain break** (10 mins) - Healthy snack
- Block 3:** 12:00 - 1pm
- Lunch:**
  - Eating lunch 1-1:10pm
  - Play 1:10-1:50pm
- Block 4:** 1:50 - 3pm
  - Circle Time/Lunch time debrief (10 mins).** This is an opportunity to discuss with students helpful strategies to solve problems in the playground.

## BULLY FREE WEEK

This week is Bully Free Week and all the classes are taking the opportunity to talk about strategies to minimise bullying and how to deal with it when it happens. At Boulcott School we'd like to think we have no bullying in the classrooms and in the playground, but unfortunately this is something that can happen at any school. It is always important to start any conversations about possible bullying by firstly defining what bullying is. Often the word 'bullying' is thrown around loosely to describe behaviour that might be better described as mean or rude.

Although these behaviours are inappropriate and not condoned, they are common behaviours for all children when they are learning to work and play with each other. We are lucky to have a strong values programme at Boulcott School, where we use our CHEER values to target these behaviours and manage conflict.

It would have been hard to avoid the media coverage over the last couple of days about primary teachers across the nation rejecting the latest pay offer from the Government and deciding to join the secondary teachers in strike action on Wednesday, 29 May. **This will mean the school will be closed for instruction on this day**, as the majority of our teaching staff are part of the NZEI union. This latest offer has pretty much no difference to the Government's previous offer and is a long way from addressing the concerns around workload and remuneration. There was a time that primary teachers had pay parity with our secondary colleagues. This is now no longer the case.



## Engage Your Brain

Adventure School are proud to announce that the host of the documentary "All in the Mind", and co-host of the TV Series "The Secret life of Girls", Nathan Wallis, Aotearoa's renowned neuroscience educator, is coming to our community with his talk - Engage Your Brain.

This talk focuses on the social/emotional aspects of your brain development - how feeling impacts our thinking. While the times that this brain really has the steering wheel is 2-8 and again in the middle of adolescence, it is relevant to all learners that want to feel engaged, enthusiastic and passionate about what they do. The fundamental mistake New Zealand society has made over the last few decades, is thinking that a two-year-old is a little seven-year-old and that the earlier we get ready to be seven, by learning numeracy and literacy, the better off we will be. That's just not how our brain develops. A large part of intelligence is problem-solving and problem-solving is hugely dependent on creativity. Creativity largely comes online, between the ages of two and seven, in a free-play, child-lead environment. Its development is inhibited if we focus instead on seven-year-old formalised literacy and numeracy. Learning is so much easier when the learner is engaged.
